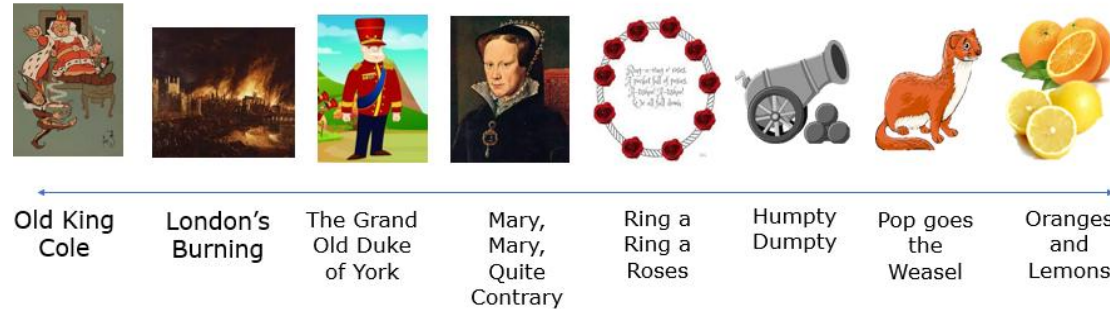

Nursery rhyme	A simple traditional song for children.

Duke	A high up man in society who rules over an area of land.
Fiddler	Someone who plays the flute.
Decurion	Roman Cavalry Officer in the Roman Army.
Cause	Reason an event happens.
Consequence	The result of an event.
Heresy	Belief that is opposite of the religious ruler.
Martyr	A person who suffers for their belie.
Symptom	An indication of the existence of something – an illness.
Bubonic plague	Disease caused by a flea bite which led to big pus filled spots in c.1348.

Belfry	Tower where church bells are found.

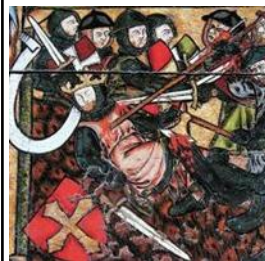

Richard of York, (1411-1460) forces were outnumbered and defeated at the Battle of Wakefield.



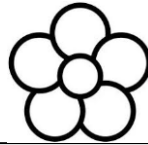
The real Humpty Dumpty was a powerful canon used by the Royalist forces during the English Civil War of 1642 – 1651.

PETAL Paragraph

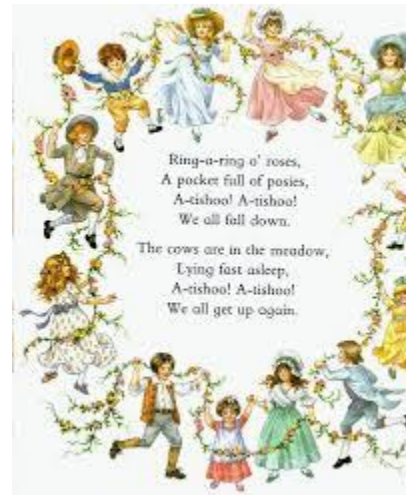
P: Ring a Ring a Roses is the most significant nursery rhyme because it includes lots of detail about the Great Plague that hit England in 1665.

E: The nursery rhyme states 'atishoo' which could relate to the symptom of sneezing. Furthermore, it suggests that a treatment of the plague was to wear 'posies' which would ward off the bad smells that medieval people believed caused the plague.

T: This means that the nursery rhymes' connections to the history of the plague is the most significant as it gives historians an insight into the fear and widespread nature of this disease in England during the 17th Century.

A: As a result of the causes, symptoms and treatments being included in the nursery rhyme it is useful for a historian's enquiry about English history.

L: Therefore, it is the most significant because of the accuracy shown in the nursery rhyme about the plague.

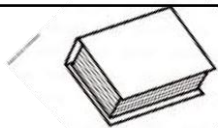
