**Edexcel English Language 2.0:** Paper 1 is called **Non Fiction Texts** where you have to read and then write a transactional piece (e.g. letter, speech, article) or a piece of Literary non-fiction (e.g. autobiography, recount). **Paper 2** is called **Contemporary Texts** where you have to write a piece of original, creative writing (using a given first line or an image for inspiration). These practice tasks prepare you for the WRITING sections of your exam as this is **worth half your total marks**. You would plan and write for **45 minutes** so detail is expected. Confidence in writing is essential for your overall success in English Language.

**Edexcel English Literature:** Paper 1 tests your knowledge of Macbeth and An Inspector Calls. Paper 2 tests your knowledge of A Christmas Carol, Conflict Poetry and Unseen Poetry. Each essay you write will take between 45 minutes and 1 hour. Careful planning is required to enable you to write in detail and to meet the mark scheme.
